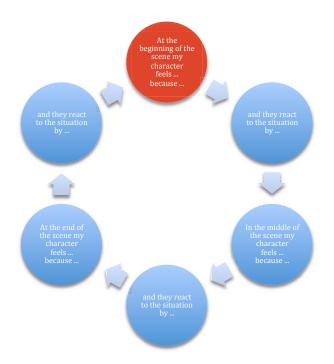
## In feelings & reactions you should

follow this structure when answering:

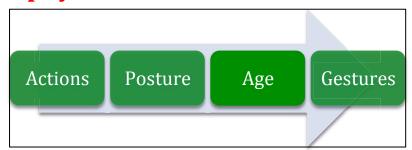
EXAMPLE (Vicious Circle - Laura): How does your character feel in this scene and how do they react to

the situation? Laura feels calm at the start of the scene as she talks about her best friend Amy to her new cellmate. She reacts by standing up and recalling the story about how she came to be in the detention centre. In the middle of the scene Laura feels angry as she recreates the murder of Amy. She reacts by demonstrating how she drowned Amy in the river. At the end of the scene Laura feels curious as she waits for a reaction from her cellmate Holly. She reacts by threatening Holly telling her they best be friends as it wouldn't be good for her if she wasn't.

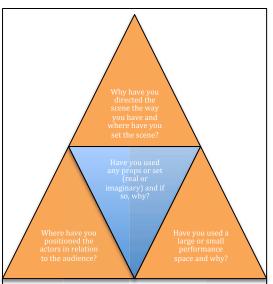
Always use different feeling words for each scene. You should also be able to speak about your feelings and reactions separately. Without linking them together as the official question does.



# In physical characterization & situation think about the following:



**EXAMPLE (Reserved) The reasons for your physical characterisation in response to each text and each of the characters situations?** The waiter works in a very posh restaurant so I imaged him to be a university aged man with good posture and a posh voice. I imagined as he lost his temper his posture would drop and he would become more animated. As the scene progresses I wanted his gestures to build to show how angry he was.



I decided to set this scene in a busy restaurant with a table for two people in the centre of the stage. I tried to show the waiter going about his daily routine looking after a selection of tables.

### In the Working Stage Areas question

I used two chairs centre stage to clearly show the audience where the table was positioned and also to give a good idea where the lady was sitting. I used a large performance space as I imagine this to be a

large restaurant and acted as if I had tables to attend to both stage left and stage right. When speaking to the lady I placed the waiter directly upstage of the table facing towards the audience so his actions and facial expressions could be clearly

seen. The waiter continues to gesture towards a table downstage left as he tries to get the lady to move. As the waiter gets annoyed he crosses downstage to storm off downstage right before heading back to the centre.
